### **MOLLIE PILCHER (Longley ) R.I.P**

Mollie was born in 1927 in Leeds, and was brought up by her Grandmother. She attended a Quaker boarding school, where her adventurous nature often got her into trouble. She attended the Chelsea College during the war years. The College had been evacuated to Wales, where the social life was greatly enhanced by a nearby American service base. She obtained her degree in Sport. Her first job was at Faversham Girls Grammar School, where she was very popular with the girls, once being sent home by the Headmistress for wearing red nail varnish and a split skirt.

It was in Faversham that Mollie met her future husband Peter. They married, had a daughter Jan and a son Mark, and in due course came to live at Barnjet Cottage in Barming where they created a beautiful garden. .. Mollie enjoyed travel, gardening, and stewarding at Leeds Castle. Sadly Peter died far too young. Mollie moved to Upper Mill in Wateringbury, and rapidly entered village life. She joined the Wateringbury Local History Society, and in 2004 became its first female Chairman.

Mollie re-met an old friend from her Faversham days in Roy Pilcher, and they enjoyed travelling together. They fell in love and married. Sadly this happiness was not to last as Mollie was diagnosed with a brain tumour, and died in the Heart of Kent Hospice on the last day of 2010. Mollie was a cheerful and jolly person who enjoyed family life and sport. She was an excellent chairman of the W.L.H.S., and had a voice which commanded attention. ### **DECEMBER PARISH COUNCIL MEETING**

*The planning committee would appreciate the opinions of parishioners in relation to planning applications prior to its meeting to help formulate the response to T & M. Please send comments to the Parish Clerk Redhill Cottage, Redhill mail Alternatively come along to the planning subcommittee meeting which is held directly after the monthly parish council meeting in the village hall on the first Tuesday of each month..*

**Planning Applications** The council had no objections to the following applications – single storey side extension at 25 Phoenix Drive, new external boiler at Oakenwood Cottage (provided the Listed Buildings officer is satisfied). The council deferred a decision on the Polytunnels application at Hugh Lowe Farms. Mrs Marian Regan attended the meeting and gave background information and details to the council.

**Allotments** – the planned December inspection had been postponed due to the snow and would be rescheduled when the weather improved.

**Train and Bus times** Residents are recommended to check on bus and train times before travelling as timetables have been adjusted.

**Village Hall Bookings** – these were now being handled by Dennis Stones.

**Salt Bins** – it was disappointing that the salt had been removed from the car park bin just before the bad weather. This loss was not an isolated incident as others in the area had also suffered a similar fate. Councillor Bev Evans thanked the volunteers who had cleared snow from the entrance to the village car park.

## **JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING**

Michael Cayzer chaired the meeting in the unavoidable absence of Kate Averill.

**The parish budget** for 2011/2012 was approved. This included provision for election expenses for May 2011. An election will only need to be held if there are more applicants than places on the council.

After discussion councillors agreed to buy a further supply of **road salts** in case of further snow and ice. The supply will be stored by the parish council and then distributed, when needed, to volunteers in the village in an effort to make roads and pavements less problematic.

**Police news** It was reported that 2 new officers PC Wilkinson and PC Healey would be joining the local team. In December 6 crimes had been reported 2 of fraud (one on e-bay and one where money had been withdrawn from a bank account) 1 burglary when items had been stolen from an outbuilding in Danns Lane, 2 thefts related to motor vehicles (number plates stolen from a vehicle in Leney Road and a radio from a car in Bow Road) and one assault on a male who was sharing a taxi home from Maidstone. CPSO Dave Gilham reminded residents that a police surgery is held on the last Wednesday of each month in the restaurant of the Watlingtonbury Hotel between noon and 1pm. This is an opportunity for residents to discuss any police related matters in an informal setting.

**Latest Planning Applications** The council's comments about the following planning applications can be viewed on the T & M website or at their offices in Kings Hill 2 storey side extension at 16 Leney Road, Outline Application for the provision of 64 two, three and four bedroom dwellings with associated roads, footpaths, parking and landscaping, including the retention and management of associated woodland on MOD land South of Discovery Drive, Kings Hill (Some of the perimeter of this land is at the end of Teston Road (opposite the North Pole pub) and Cattering Wood).

**Dog Fouling** is becoming a problem. The playing fields and Glebe Meadow were giving the most cause for concern. It was felt that the vast majority of dog owners are responsible and pick up after their pets. Residents can help to solve the problem by reporting details to the T & M dog warden on 01732 876181. To be most effective the warden needs names of offending dog owners or the times and places so patrols can be mounted.

Borough Councillor Frances English reported that Tonbridge & Malling Council had received notification from the government of a 28% reduction over a 2 year period in the money given to the council to provide local services. Fortunately the council had been prudent and so has some cash reserves but all expenditure will need to be carefully reviewed. Following the December meeting when a resident drew the council's attention to the overgrown state of the walkway between the Tonbridge Road and Allington Gardens, T & M's workforce had cleared the area and it would be placed on the regular maintenance schedule. She had also investigated the problem of the planning condition regarding drainage from the shop at the corner of Boorman Mews. This is an ongoing investigation by T & M officials.

The next meetings of the council, to which all residents are welcome, take place in the village hall at 7.30pm on 1 February and 1 March. The planning sub-committee meetings follow immediately after the general council meetings. The Sports & Recreation Association, who manage the playing fields, are scheduled to give a presentation of its activities at the February meeting.

### **WATERINGBURY WEATHER WATCH**

January 2010 was the coldest I have recorded in the last 20 years, while at the other end of the year we had the coldest December on record. Apart from these two months, the year seemed to pan out much as expected. Total rainfall was about 710 mm (28") which was just about 23 mm (1") above the annual average. The minimum temperatures were about 0.5°C (1C (1°F) below the annual average and the maximums were about 1°C (2°F) below.

The general tenor of our weather is determined by the "Jet Stream" (wind in the upper atmosphere). When it is behaving itself it blows more or less from East to West and brings Atlantic low pressure systems across us, which together with the sea's "Gulf Stream Drift" help to keep us relatively warm in the winter. However, in December the Jet Stream broke into two parts and the part affecting us was coming from the Arctic bringing the snow and ice that most of the country experienced.

I am glad to say that, for the moment at least, the Jet Stream has reverted to its usual East to West pattern and the January 2011 mild, wet weather is the result.

A rash of comic or infantile songs were recorded and in particular George Formby with his ukulele and we heard what is considered to be his signature tune, "When I'm Cleaning Windows" Ben Lyon and Bebe Daniels, American by birth, chose to stay in England rather than taking the easy option of returning home whilst we were at war, entertaining as many people as they could. In 1942 the first American service men arrived in England and trad jazz heralded their arrival together with their

dancing, including jiving. During the evening we heard music from Glen Miller, Anne Shelton. Vera Lynn and Florence Desmond and saw pictures of Flanagan and Allen, Betty Grable and some heart rending pictures of children being evacuated singing The Lambeth Walk. GS

### **WATERINGBURY NEEDS YOU ! HELP TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE**

Wateringbury Cricket Club have registered to take part in "Nat West Cricket Force" a nationwide exercise which is to take place over 8, 9 and 10 April 2011. (Please note these dates can be altered to suit the works being undertaken).

The main purpose will be to renovate the pavilion and improve the playing facilities at the sports field in Wateringbury. However, due to the fact that the sports field is a facility shared by the whole

community, it has been decided to combine the Cricket Club's efforts with the Wateringbury Sports and Recreation Association and broaden the scope of works.

The proposed list of works is as follows :

Application of Spring/Summer fertiliser over the whole of the main playing field (approx 14,000 sq. metres)

Paint the pavilion and repair/replace external boarding

Paint the storage sheds.

Litter pick the whole area

Clear vegetation from under the trees and strim back weeds adjacent to the boundary

Clean/treat all the commemorative benches down at the playing field.

Erect the cricket mobile practice net and weld loops to the storage cabin to enable the net to be securely padlocked when not in use.

Prune trees around the playing field and dispose of branches, etc.

Work on the cricket square before the season commences.

Clean/scrub the cricket sight screens.

Provide refreshments for all volunteers.

To succeed in this exercise we need your help, whether it be as an organisation or as an individual.

Meetings will be held to carefully plan the operation and allocate specific tasks to volunteers. We need volunteers to give their skills, services and time.

We need donations of materials from businesses.

It is our intention to inform the local press, radio etc. to gain publicity.

Our County Councillor, Richard Long, has contributed towards the overall cost of the cricket mobile practice net and will be invited to "unveil " the facility.
